IN THE SHADOW OF KOREMATSU: Democratic Liberties and National Security

In the Shadow of Korematsu: Democratic Liberties and National Security tackles pressing questions about the significance of judicial independence for a constitutional democracy committed to both security and the rule of law. What will happen when those detained, harassed or discriminated against under the mantle of national security turn to the courts for protection? Will the judiciary fall passively in line with the president (as it did during WWII in *Korematsu v. U.S.*) or serve as guardian of the Bill of Rights (as it did during the 1984 *Korematsu coram nobis* reopening). The book opens a path through the legal thicket so American society might better accommodate *both* security and liberty.
